## Update on the St. Pete Pier™

Yes, the city has trademarked the name! It has been a few years since we covered this subject and there has been a lot of progress on the new pier. Construction is still ongoing with the whole project well over 50% complete.

After a slow start, with various concepts being studied, the replacement for the "Million Dollar Pier" is becoming a reality. The new pier is pegged at \$76M and will be dramatically different from the pier we knew in high school.



This aerial photo was taken this month and shows the overall situation of the new pier.

All along the walkways will be sculpture and other outdoor art. Access to the pier head will by two different routes. The pier extends 3065 feet into the bay. For historic purposes, a few pilings from the original pier have been left in place to view.



The large white rectangular building on the south pier approach is a *Doc Ford's Rum Bar and Grille*. This is a theme restaurant named for the main

character in author Randy Wayne White's book series about a Florida Gulf Coast adventurer. Other Doc Ford restaurants are on Ft. Myers Beach, Sanibel Island and Captiva Island.

Construction involves virtually the whole peninsula between the Vinoy Yacht Basin on the north and the St. Pete Yacht Basin on the south. There are new parks and commercial establishments being built on land that used to house a pool, parking and a solarium. During construction, 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue North, from Beach Drive to the pier is closed to traffic and pedestrians.

Completion date for the project is hard to find, but we will report it when it happens.

### **Classmates Care**

## **SPHS Getting Major Upgrades**

A two-year program to upgrade our high school is underway. The county and private citizens have allocated \$32.8 M to repair and modernize the historic school. It is part of a county-wide plan to upgrade nine schools for \$158.5 M.

Built in 1926, its classic architecture landed it on the National Registry of Historic Places in 1984. This means exterior changes to the original building are subject to review and approval.

Construction will include renovating classrooms, the auditorium and the administration office space, building a new cafeteria and enlarged courtyard area. Overall updates to infrastructure throughout the school will include a new roof, updated heating and air conditioning systems, electrical wiring, plumbing and paint.

New spaces for art, band and chorus students will be added adjacent to the cafeteria, thus relieving previous crowding.

Stuart Field is also receiving its first improvements in many years. The concession stands, restrooms and track surface are included in the upgrades, as well as a new scoreboard. Too, a rubberized track will be installed.

The playing field surface itself will be the first school in the county with artificial turf.
