

## Graduations


We missed the passing of classmate Tom Fredrick last summer. We only found out about it after the last newsletter was not deliverable to him:

**Dr. Thomas Frank Fredrick** 84, passed away on Tuesday August 17, 2021, at his beloved home which overlooked the Gulf of Mexico in Port Richey, FL. Dr. Fredrick was born September 6, 1936, in Covington, Kentucky. He was the son of Earl and Hazel Fredrick and older brother of David Fredrick. After graduating from St. Petersburgh High School, he enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corp. and after being discharged he went on to graduate from Palmer School of Chiropractic. He later owned and operated two separate Chiropractic clinics in Mayville, KY, and in Holiday, FL. for 38 years.

He was Commissioned a Kentucky Colonel in 1959, Chiropractor of the Year 1969, and A Chiropractic Knight of the Roundtable, 1971. He was also the author of "Life Is Terrific", which was a published newspaper column from 1967 to 1972. His hobbies included sailing, fishing, photography, and travel in his RV. Dr. Fredrick is survived by his five children, Debbie Fredrick, Nimmo, Charles (Fred) Fredrick, Doris Fredrick, Larry Fredrick, and Arnold Fredrick. He is also survived by seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.
