Classmates that live out of town have been showing up at our luncheons, when they visit friends and family in St. Pete. Of course, we have the regulars who come for the fellowship, news and a good meal. Over a year's time, we see about 50 different classmates at the luncheons. That is about 10% of the original class. We know that about 36% of the class still resides in the Tampa Bay area and that 26% of the class is deceased. In the whole state of Florida, we still have 200 classmates. One third of our surviving classmates live outside of Florida.

At our last luncheon, it was suggested that we should have a class-wide **75th birthday event**. Most members of our class are having their 75th birthday in 2011. Graduations



Dr. **Fred L. Greiner**, Sr., Husband, Father, Grandfather, Psychiatrist, Financial Analyst, Cattle Rancher, Real Estate Developer, World Traveler and SPHS classmate, died on April 10, 2011.

Fred was born in Toledo, Ohio on March 14, 1937. Fred's highly-developed intellect and wide-ranging ambitions were shaped early in life by his father, an inventor, university professor, entrepreneur, and scientist who fled pre-war Germany to America. Fred excelled academically at an early age, especially at military school, where he says he learned discipline, and how to get more from the system by working with it rather than bucking it. He graduated high school early, and went on to earn a medical degree at Emory University in 1961.

Fred then became an intern at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta, where he met his first wife, Janelle. Rather than beginning a residency program in medicine, Fred chose to first serve his country as an Air Force Flight Surgeon stationed in Bitburg, Germany. He flew missions throughout Europe and the Mideast, serving on a rapid response recovery team for the Mercury and Gemini space flights.

After military service, Fred returned to Atlanta, entered a residency program in psychiatry, began a successful practice, and raised his three children. He became president of the Georgia Psychiatric Association in 1978.

In the early 1980's, Fred visited Costa Rica, an adventure that was to shape the remainder of his life. Fred became an expert grass farmer and cattleman, and built several large cattle ranches in the beautiful tropics. For the next 30 years, he refined the genetics of his cattle and grasses.

In the 1990's, Fred met and fell in love with his wife, Gaylyn. Together, they travelled extensively and eventually established residence between Hutchison Island, Florida, Costa Rica, and Lugano, Switzerland. They attended the 55th class reunion.

For the past four years, Fred battled Polycystic Kidney Disease, to which he succumbed.

We extend our sympathies to classmate **Joyce Lindsay Sperry** on the loss of her husband, David. David died on May 25' 2011.
