Classmate **William White** has become interested in the Manhattan Casino, which is located at 642 22<sup>nd</sup> St. S. in St. Petersburg. Built in 1925, the Manhattan Casino is significant for its contribution to entertainment and the culture in the African American community for more than forty years. Some of American music's most legendary performers played at the Manhattan including James Brown, Louis Armstrong, Fats Waller, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Lionel Hampton, Cab Calloway, Ray Charles, Nat King Cole, Sarah Vaughn, Fats Domino and the Ink Spots. After the era of the big bands, the Manhattan Casino hosted dances featuring local artists; rock and roll and blues singers popular in the 1960's. After it closed in 1968, the City of St. Petersburg acquired the property and renovated it in 2005, for \$2.8 million. In May, ground was broken for a restaurant at the Manhattan Casino, Sylvia's. Sylvia's is patterned after the renowned Sylvia's restaurant in Harlem, NYC. Sylvia's serves soul food and the St. Pete version will simulate the original menu.



**“Jr.-Sr. Prom Planned for Tonight**

Students to Dance Under Big Top

It was released Monday via the colorful clown which adorned novel invitations that juniors and seniors will dance in a gala, circus-themed atmosphere at the traditional Junior-Senior Prom tonight. Decorations and floor show will carry out the theme, formally dubbed “Starlight and Sawdust” which is enchantingly characteristic of the circus.

The long-awaited, highly secretive ball will revel in all its sparkling glory from nine till one at the Coliseum. Dick Crockett and his orchestra will provide the music for the formal dance which for so many years has served as a final and thrilling farewell to the seniors from the Junior Class.

Sarah Shaw and Jim Budd, co-chairmen of the Prom, have issued these following rules for Prom attendance:

1. Those receiving free invitations will be all seniors, and those juniors who have paid their 75 cents class dues by April 27. If dues were not paid by this time your invitation will cost two dollars.
2. You may obtain a two-dollar invitation for an outsider who is:
  - a. Junior or senior of another high school;
  - b. Alumnus of SPHS;
  - c. Engaged couples whose engagement has been formally announced; and
  - d. Married Couples.”

**“Stull shuts out Hillsborough 1-0**

Don Vaughn, the Devil left fielder, who was playing in left center was off at the crack of the bat and speared the ball on the run in deep left field. That was the last out of the ball game.

Stull fanned seven in another of his excellent pitching performances, never being seriously in trouble. But it was a good thing he was on, because the Devils managed to get only three hits off two Terrier twirlers.

Coach Bob Gilbert's team won the game in the third inning. Don Rohrbaugh, who also starred in the field, walked, stole second and went to third on an infield error. Coach Gilbert then ordered Gordon Mackenzie, who had walked, to get caught trying a fake steal from first to second. Gordon followed instructions and in the run down attempt, Rohrbaugh waltzed home with what proved to be the winning tally.”
